Father, forgive them...

There was a point last week when I had to really question the wisdom of my plan to preach on Job during the month of October. Preaching “Divine Absence” in a way that does not lead to either despair or agnosticism is something of a treacherous path, and I’m not entirely sure I succeeded. On the other hand, it is certainly proving to be an interesting journey. And please remember that “plan” is a bit of an overstatement. It’s not that I had a plan so much as I decided to do it. It’s sort of like sermon titles—those things I am supposed to invent for the newspaper two days *before* beginning to write the sermon.

One thing that comes with nine years of preaching to the same congregation is a desire to venture into different territory. So lately, while staying mostly within the lectionary, I have been tackling some less-preached texts—texts like Esther and Job, particularly the parts of Job other than God’s speech from the whirlwind which does seem to get a lot of press. *[continued p. 2]*

It’s good for all of us to engage some of the more challenging parts of the biblical canon—stories that we wish weren’t there because of their violence or exclusiveness. Passages that describe a God or a Jesus we don’t particularly like. That is a part of taking the bible seriously. So it is that on the heels of the American Library Association’s observance of banned book week, the *Christian Century* blog brought me this news:

Conservapedia, Andrew Schlafy’s answer to the perceived liberal bias of Wikipedia has taken on an ambitious new project: the “Conservative Bible Project,” a collaborative, wiki-based version of the Old and New Testaments intended “to correct the rampant liberalism of mainstream translations,” in some cases by simply removing offending phrases. I am not making this up! The following examples come from the project’s website:

The earliest, most authentic manuscripts lack this verse set forth at Luke 23:34: Jesus said, “Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.” Is this a liberal corruption of the original? This does not appear in any other Gospel, and the simple fact is that some of the persecutors of Jesus *did* know what they were doing. This quotation is a favorite of liberals but should not appear in a conservative Bible.

Socialistic terminology permeates English translations of the Bible, without justification. This improperly encourages the “social justice” movement among Christians. For example, the conservative word “volunteer” is mentioned only once in the ESV, yet the socialistic word “comrade” is used three times, “laborer(s)” is used 13 times, “labored” 15 times, and “fellow” (as in “fellow worker”) is used 55 times.

All I have to say is I hope you are more interested in continuing to wrestle with scripture and puzzle it’s meanings in many imperfect translations than you are in deciding what it should have said and making it so. That’s my plan for now. Read any good banned books lately?
